Indication(s)

1. **Migraine Prophylaxis:** Used in the prevention of migraines in adults. Generally used in addition to other preventive treatments.

Dosage Form & Strength

Solution; Subcutaneous Preservative Free Autoinjector: 70 mg/mL; 140 mg/mL

Dosing by Indication

- Dosing for Migraine Prophylaxis in Adults:
 - o Inject 70-140 mg dose under the skin (subcutaneously) once a month.
 - o If dose is missed administer the dose as soon as possible and next dose is one month from last dose.

Mechanism of Action & Pharmacology

- MOA: Aimovig is a human monoclonal antibody. This drug blocks the normal function of the calcitonin generelated peptide (CGRP) receptor. This is beneficial because CGRP is a protein that causes intense inflammation in the meninges and nerve ending of brain.
- Metabolism: Through the nonspecific proteolytic pathway | Time to Peak: Around 6 days | Half-Life
 Elimination: 28 days

Special Populations & Considerations

- Disease related concern in patients with **cardiovascular disease** due to possibility for medication to increase blood pressure.
- Latex allergy is a concern since the packaging; such as the needle shield/needle cap; may contain latex.
- Aimovig may start working w/in one month but it generally takes between 2-3 months for patients to benefit from the medication.
- Number of headache days is halved in approximately 49% of patients on the 70 mg dose and up to 70% of patients on the 140 mg dose.
- Regarding **Episodic migraines**, there is a reduction of 2-4 headache days or 48 days per year.
- Regarding Chronic migraines, there is a reduction of 6-8 headache days per month or 96 days (3 months) per year.

Side Effects

- Injection site pain, redness, swelling;
- Dizziness, cramps, vision changes, passing out, constipation, increased blood pressure

Monitoring Parameters

Check blood pressure regularly | Number of monthly migraine days

Patient Counseling Information

- Medication is used to prevent (not treat) migraines.
- Aimovig does not work for everybody and may take up to 3 months for patients to benefit from the medication.
- Be aware of common side effects such as Injection site pain/redness/swelling & constipation
- Aimovig is injected under the skin in the abdomen, thigh, or upper arm.
- When storing refrigerate (Not freeze) using the original container. Once opened keep in room temp and use w/in 7 days.
- After 7 days in room temperature, discard unused medication.

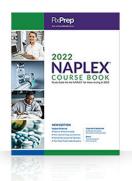
